listen to a keynote address from Sir David Carter. In his presentation he used the phrase 'collaboration is the oxygen of school improvement'. Unsurprisingly Sir David then continued with the theme of collaboration. I've tried to capture and share the thinking here and how it resonates with our work.

When does Collaboration work best?

When there is a clear set of agreed goals about the intended outcome of the collaboration - PURPOSE

When there is recognition that giving and receiving is expected of all partners - MUTUALITY

When there is an understanding that practice might need to change even if it is not a performance issue (vet) - CHANGE

When there is a clear timescale for the collaboration to deliver its objectives – PACE

That there is an opportunity cost in terms of finance, resources and time – PRIORITISATION

We are now busy in the season of recruitment. We are advertising for the position of IT Strategic Manager with a closing date of Monday 27th January 2020.

The role of DPSI is still in its window of advertisement but has certainly drawn attention from leaders across the country.

Former lvybridge Students star in Champions Cup Victory for Exeter Chiefs

On Saturday, 18 January, former lvybridge Community College students Dave Ewers, Sam Simmonds, Stu Townsend, Sam Hill and Joe Simmonds all played a big role in Exeter's 33 -14 victory over French side, La Rochelle, sealing a home quarter final in the Champions Cup, with four out of the five scoring points in the game.



Flanker, Dave Ewers was able to pick from the base of the ruck before driving under the

posts for the score giving Joe Simmonds an easy conversion. Number 8, Sam Simmonds, scored his first of two tries just after the break off of Exeter's renowned pick and go attack, he was able to crash his way over which again was expertly converted. The second score came from a dominant scrum which was controlled perfectly by Simmonds who was able to dive on the ball once it had crossed the line for his second try of the game, earning Exeter the bonus point for four tries. The final score of the game was by Townsend who was able to finish off a 70 metre break in the 61st minute to take the game away from the visitors before Joe was able to convert, taking the score to 33 -14.

As a College our Rugby programme continues to flourish. Currently our Year 10 Team is in the last eight in the country. As role models, our former players make teachers and students alike so proud. All of the players involved visit the College regularly to speak to students, most recently at our Sports Awards evening.

Space Day at Woodlands Park

At the start of our space day, we went into the hall and prepared it for Space Ambassador Mr Grocott's lecture on Space – the future of space travel and the growing UK space industry. 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Mental Health and Well-Being Staff Professional Development Session at Plymstock School



As part of our Continuing Professional Development programme at Plymstock School, staff on Monday had the opportunity to receive training from Sam Garner, a qualified Cognitive Behaviour Therapist and child adolescent practitioner.

With both teachers and students increasingly experiencing mental health concerns. Sam identified a need for schools to provide proactive support for those suffering from anxiety. In our training session, Sam focused on how our brains work and develop, along with risk protection factors for mental health and she explained how we can support our students' well-being, along with our own! Sam is straight talking, motivational, empathetic and so much fun. Her humour put the whole staff at ease and created an atmosphere of warmth and enjoyment on a cold, bleak January afternoon. Sam's core purpose is to help both teachers and students alike. She emphasised the importance of building positive relationships highlighting that they are the foundation of everything in life. As a Cognitive Behaviour Therapist, Sam asserts that if we change our thoughts to more positive ones and manage negative ones we will have better mental health: it's about being proactive and not reactive.

Mental health and well-being affects every area of our lives. Therefore, as teachers we have a responsibility to do all we can to be supportive of students, and our colleagues, to ensure that we promote mental health and don't inflict mental harm.

We left Sam Garner's session refreshed and inspired. But, most importantly, we left armed with some key strategies to help develop our capacity to empathise with our students and to aid us in our own lives and ability to manage our own stress.
